New medical referral contract

Former Calvo-Tenorio lawyer awarded

ATTORNEY Tom Fisher, former legal counsel for the Calvo-Tenorio gubernatorial campaign, has won the contract to provide off-island medical services to

Guam residents going off-island to receive medical treatment in California, Hawaii and the Philippines.

Fisher was also the former law partner of Lt. Governor Ray Tenorio's wife, Attorney Naoko Shimizu.

Several attempts to contact Atty. Fisher were unsuccessful.

The professional services agreement between the Office of the Governor and the Guam Medical Referral Service was signed on July 26 by Fisher and Frank Arriola, the governor's chief of

staff. Rose Ramsey, the certifying officer, signed the contract on July 27.

The contract was forwarded to the Attorney General's Office for review yesterday by John Rios, director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research. Rios signed off on the contract on Monday.

\$2.7M contract protested

Medical referral bid goes to campaign counsel

chosen to run the Guam Medical Referral office, according to a proposed contract that has been signed by governor's Chief of Staff Franklin Ariola.

The contract is awaiting signatures from Calvo and Attorney General Leonardo Rapadas, but it has been approved by John Rios, the acting director of the Bureau of Budget and Management Research.


Fisher's business has prompted a letter of protest from a former medical referral office director, who said yesterday that the procurement choice leaves "room for suspicion." The governor's office didn't comment on the proposed contract earlier this week, but spokesman Troy Torres said last night that Fisher's business was selected because it offered the lowest bid amount and is the most qualified bidder.

"The chief of staff signed the contract, but it is still an ongoing procurement matter," Torres said. "The governor hasn't yet signed the contract. We do know that Fisher and Associates was the lowest bidder. That's to put to rest any concern."

The government of Guam hires a contractor to run its medical referral offices in Manila, Hawaii and Los Angeles to help local residents who must leave island to seek medical attention. The offices help arrange lodging and transportation, among other services. According to a Bureau of Budget and Management Research memo, the proposed contract is for one year, with a possible extension of four more years, each year costing \$540,000. That breaks down to:

- ▲ About \$188,000 to send patients to Hawaii;
- ▲ About \$188,000 to send patients to Los Angeles; and
- ▲ About \$162,000 to send patients to Manila.

Before the new administration took office, Fisher provided legal

representation to the Calvo-Tenorio campaign, including attending regular Guam Election Commission meetings and making statements to local journalists. Fisher also helped the campaign file a Federal Communications Commission complaint against Marianas Media Investors.

Until recently, Fisher's law firm was Shimizu, Canto and Fisher, which has since disbanded. His law partners were Naoko Shimizu, who is the lieutenant governor's wife, and James Canto, who became legal counsel for the governor's office.

Calvo recently nominated Canto to become a Superior Court of Guam judge, but the attorney hasn't been confirmed in the Legislature. Fisher could not immediately be reached for comment.

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

was recently awarded to a new business started by an attorney with ties to Gov. Eddie Calvo and Lt. Gov. Ray Tenorio.

Guam Medical Referral Service, which is owned by attorney Tom Fisher, has been working for the government since July, even without Attorney General Leonardo Rappadas' or the governor's signatures on the contract.

The contract is worth as much as \$2.7 million over five years. The selection process has been protested by another bidder.

Fisher is a former law partner with the lieutenant governor's wife. He also served as a legal counsel for the Calvo-Tenorio gubernatorial campaign.

In response to concerns about the selection, governor's spokesman Troy Torres said Wednesday that Fisher was chosen because he is the most qualified and offered the lowest bid. However, Arriola said yesterday that procurement restrictions left him unable to provide documents or data to verify either of Torres' statements.

Arriola said Fisher began work on July 24. When asked yesterday if the contract was final even without signatures from the attorney general or the governor, Arriola made this statement: "We are moving on. And I think that it would (be) a formaliza-

ty for the attorney general and the governor to sign (the contract.) It has gone through our process and we need to service our customers."

Arriola said GovGuam was "under the gun" to hire a medical referral company in July so there would be no gap in service for sick or injured residents who need off-island treatment.

Fisher's company already is providing that service, and if the attorney general finds issue with the medical referral contract during an ongoing legal review, "then there is a problem," Arriola said.

"We will take it from there. But we need to move on," Arriola said yesterday during the press conference.

Carlina Charfauros, a spokeswoman for the Office of the attorney General, confirmed that her office received the medical referral services contract for review yesterday.

Despite a request for comment, the AG's office didn't respond to Arriola's statement about how the attorney general's signature was a formality.

Neither did James Canto, the governor's legal counsel, who is a former law partner of Fisher and a current nominee to be a judge in the Superior Court of Guam.

Governor's spokesman Philip Leon Guerrero said Canto would issue a statement about the legality of the contract yesterday afternoon.

Fisher responds

Fisher yesterday said that Guam Medical Referral Service is fully qualified for the government contract, and it was proper and "necessary" to begin work in July, even when the AG and governor had not signed his contract yet. He said the work for the contract may have begun July 24 or as early July 21.

"The point is to make sure that these people who are going through an inherently stressful time are treated well," Fisher said. "If you are sick and have to travel off island, the last thing you want to worry about is housing, transportation and communication with family back on Guam. We want to make sure that worry is taken off their shoulders."

GovGuam's medical referral service is responsible for coordinating clinical treatment for sick residents who must go off island to receive care. The contract helps arrange lodging and transportation to medical appointments, and generally acts as a "concierge service," Fisher said.

As an explanation of his credentials, Fisher said he has experience as a small business owner who works with deadlines and contracts, and his staff members have decades of administrative experience. His legal background with medical privacy laws also is part of his credentials, Fisher said.

"We were selected and I am capable of fulfilling this contract," he said. "We've got a great team assembled and we are working. We are making sure that all the servic-

es are accomplished and people who are going off island for medical treatment are treated well."

Fisher said he wouldn't respond to any questions about his connections to the Calvo-Tenorio campaign. Fisher said it was inappropriate for him to respond to the allegations in a procurement protest filed by Peter Alexis Ada, who was head of the medical referral office under then-Gov. Felix Camacho.

On Wednesday, Ada sent a letter of protest to the General Services Administration, which handles GovGuam procurement, alleging that his bid price was "jeopardized and tampered with."

Arriola said yesterday that he couldn't discuss Ada's letter, however he added that Ada had "every right" to pursue his procurement protest.

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HGHites added to NFL deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Quarterback Donovan McNabb eagled onto the practice field with his Minnesota Vikings team in Mankato, Minn., on Thursday afternoon, before being told he and other NFL players with new contracts still needed to be patient. And then, shortly before 5 EDT, the good news came: The wait was over.

"Were we going to have the opportunity to step on the field today or not?" McNabb said, explaining his thoughts while on hold for word of a completed collective bargaining agreement. "Good thing we got this thing settled. And now here we are."

Players ratified a new, 10-year CBA on Thursday, hours after it was finalized, and two people familiar with the negotiations told The Associated Press the contract allows NFL to eventually become the first major U.S. professional sports league to use blood testing for human growth hormone.

They spoke on condition of anonymity because no formal announcement had been made about the details of the CBA. 

In *Fleet Services*, the government had issued a RFP for the operation, management and maintenance of Guam's Mass Transit services, but the process encountered two bid protests which eventually made their way to the lower courts, and then the Supreme Court of Guam. Before addressing the specific arguments raised by the parties, the Supreme Court examined the RFP process, and decided that the wrong procurement process was used in violation of the procurement law. The court used a two-pronged test in looking at the mass transit services, the more significant factor of which was to decide whether the operating, maintaining and repairing of buses required the exercise of professional and significant business judgment. The court found that no professional or significant business judgment was required, and therefore, the services must be non-professional in nature.

In looking at these medical assistance services, we must also question whether they require any professional or significant business judgment. The services mainly involve the transportation of those in need of off-island medical care and their families, and the coordination of all their medical and personal needs. No special education or expertise is needed to provide these medical assistance services. Therefore, these services may not be classified as professional services.

Having decided that the wrong process had been used in *Fleet Services*, the court next considered whether the situation could be remedied in any manner. Apparently, no contract had been signed by the parties in *Fleet Services*, and so the court regarded the situation as pre-award which pursuant to law requires either a cancellation of the solicitation or a revision to comply with the law. Given that the only procurement method therein was the competitive sealed bid process, the court decided that a revision was not possible, and that the solicitation would have to be cancelled.

In the case with medical assistance services, however, the stage of the procurement might be regarded as post-award since the contract has already been signed by the parties.¹ Although the Governor and the Attorney General have not yet approved the contract,² there is an indication in the procurement law that execution by the parties alone gives rise to a contract. See, 5 GCA §5121(c) and comment thereto.

¹ However, please see my first comment above in which I indicated that the government party is the Guam Medical Referral Office, Office of the Governor. Instead, GSA has signed this contract without authority. Therefore, there is an argument that there is no contract yet because the Guam Medical Referral Office has not yet signed the contract, and without a contract, the pre-award remedies would have to be looked at.

² Even if the Governor signs as a party on behalf of the Guam Medical Referral Office, the Governor would sign a second time as the approving authority for all contracts pursuant to 5 GCA §522601, although there is some authority in 5 GCA §5121(c) indicating that the Governor's approval is not necessary for procurement contracts.
