About the Guam Preservation Trust

The Guam Preservation Trust (GPT) was created as a nonprofit public corporation in 1990 by Public Law 20-151, and is governed by a Board of Directors. It is dedicated to preserving Guam's historic sites and culture as well as educating the public about those issues. Although primarily tasked with restoring historic structures, which are listed in the Guam Register of Historic Places and/or the National Register of Historic Places, GPT also funds various types of cultural preservation projects. The Board of Directors consists of 10 members representing 5 fields of expertise: Archaeology, Architecture, Chamorro Culture, History and Planning. There are two members in each field (primary and alternate capacities). Board members appointed by the Governor and approved by the Legislature to the Historic Review Board of the Guam Department of Parks and Recreation, automatically sit on the Trust Board.

Its mandated purposes are:

-To seek outside grants and donations;

-To acquire title to threatened Guam properties for the preservation of their historical value, whether in fee simple, by leasehold, or by easement, and whether through donation, transfer, dedication or purchase;

-To award grants for:

I. Historic Property Documentation and Register Nomination

This program assists in the documentation of the historic significance of places, objects, structures, buildings, and sites, and in the formal process for registration and nomination for listing on the Guam and/or National Register of Historic

II. Public Interpretation and Presentation

This program provides assistance in the interpretation and presentation of one or more historic properties for public appreciation and enjoyment.

III. Architectural History

This program focuses on architectural research and documentation of historic structures.

IV. Repair, Restoration or Renovation of Historic Buildings and Structures

This program assists owners of historic properties or interested community organizations in the care and treatment of deteriorating historic structures and buildings.

V. Ethnography and Oral History

This program provides assistance for research on and documentation of historic places and the traditional cultural values, and practices that give these places, values, and practices significance. The research methods used in this program are those of ethnography and oral history.

VI. Archival Research

This program provides assistance in archival research that focuses on specific historic places or broad patterns of events significant in Guam's history.

VII. Archaeological Research

This program provides assistance in archaeological research, with the exception of archaeology that is required by law to complete compliance obligations imposed in development review and permitting processes.

VIII. Miscellaneous

The miscellaneous program provides for potential consideration of proposals that can be justified according to the purposes of GPT but which do not fall within the programs listed.

PROGRESS IN FY 2010

Community Partnerships

The Guam Preservation Trust has partnered with over 25 public, private, and individuals from the community to oversee more than 30 programs and projects to accomplish *proposed outcomes* for this year. All have been successful in their respective delivery to the community for their benefit and appreciation.

During Fiscal Year 2010, the Guam Preservation Trust Board of Directors appropriated a total of about \$1.2 million to fund all programs and projects. Most importantly are the community's contributions as partners to accomplish the objectives of the programs and projects. An estimated total of over \$1 million of in-kind and cash contribution from partner organizations and individuals have been dedicated towards the *proposed outcomes* for this year.

Regional and National Support

The Guam Preservation Trust has made strides in reaching out for professional and technical resources from the region and the national preservation arena. These resources are invaluable and contribute to the capacity building of our community in the area of preservation.

The result of our efforts have formalized partnerships with regional and national organizations: Asian American & Pacific Islanders Caucus for Historic Preservation (AAPI); National History Day, Inc. (NHD); National Trust for Historic Preservation (NTHP), Western Division; SNR Denton LLP; University of Hawaii (UH); National Park Service (NPS); Association for Preservation Technologies International (APT), and the Nautical Archaeology Society (NAS).

REVENUES & EXPENDITURES










The Guam Preservation Trust receives most of its revenues from the Building Permit Fees administered by the Guam Department of Public Works. For Fiscal Year 2010, a total of \$627,352 of building permit fees was recorded, a 46.4% decrease from the 2009 total of \$1,170,993. The decrease is a result of decrease in construction activity on Guam for that period. The decrease is mostly attributed by the moratorium placed on commercial and land development applications by he Guam Waterworks Authority. Although the moratorium was lifted in April 2009, we expect to see an overwhelming increase of construction activity for Fiscal Year 2011.

Interest income on investments decreased between 2009 and 2010. In Fiscal Year 2010, \$6,488 was earned on interest income, compared to \$65,831 in Fiscal Year 2009. The decrease is due to the decrease in capital investments and the volatile investment markets. In FY 2010, a total of \$400,000 was drawn from the investment accounts to defray capital improvement projects approved by the Board.

Future Outlook

In 2006, Guam's preservation stakeholders presented the Guam Preservation Trust Five-Year Historic Preservation Master Plan as a statement of our community's bold step towards taking action to preserve and protect our heritage for all to benefit.

The plan's framework is goal-oriented and therefore provides strategies that if coordinated well, will bring together Guam's citizens and the preservation community to identify where our diverse goals complement historic preservation and how we can all work together to ultimately preserve Guam's heritage.

Ethnography and Oral History

The Guam Preservation Trust, in collaboration with organizations involved in ethnography and oral history, will dedicate resources, to research and document: 1) historic places; and 2) traditional cultural values and practices significant to Guam.

Repair, Rehabilitation, Restoration or Renovation of Historic Buildings and Structures

The Guam Preservation trust, in collaboration with other organizations and property owners, will dedicate for the care and treatment of deteriorating historic structures and buildings.

Archaeological Research

The Guam Preservation Trust will work with archaeological organizations to provide for archaeological research to better understand Guam's history.

Public Interpretation and Presentation

The Guam Preservation Trust will assist historians and other writers in the interpretation and presentation of historic properties for public education and appreciation.

Historic Property Documentation and Register Nomination

The Guam Preservation Trust will provide opportunities for the documentation of the historic significance of places, objects, structures, buildings, and sites, and in the formal process for registration and nomination for listing on the Guam and/or National Register of Historic Places.

Archival Research

The Guam Preservation Trust, in collaboration with archival organizations, will develop and provide archival research that focuses on specific historic places or broad patters of events significant in Guam's history for public education and appreciation.

Architectural History

The Guam Preservation Trust, in collaboration with architectural and engineering organizations, will develop architectural research and documentation of historic structures for use in rehabilitation, renovation, restoration, or re-construction.

Asian and Pacific Islanders American Historic Preservation Caucus

As a founding member of this newly formed organization, GPT will collaborate with its Regional partners to provide capacity building programs to advance preservation in Guam and in the Pacific region.

Historic Lujan House Re-dedication

The Historic Lujan House will showcase Guam's history through its architectural vernacular of pre post-war period on Guam. The 1911 structure will celebrate its centennial year in July 2011.

Taleyfak Bridge Construction

The Historic Taleyfak Bridge in Agat will provide a glimpse of Spanish architecture on Guam.

Guam Legislature Rehabilitation

GPT along with the Guam Legislature and the people of Guam will witness the groundbreaking of the home of Guam's Lawmakers.

Archaeological Database MARC

A continued collaborative effort with the University of Guam MARC, this resource will provide a tool for planners, historians, archaeologists and other preservationists to better interpret Guam's history.

Inalahan Revitalization Plan

With American Institute of Architects, Micronesia Chapter as the lead, the revitalization plan will provide the tool for the community in Inalahan to further develop the historic district.
