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A Report to our Citizens in FY 2016

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A total of 75 3rd to 7th graders participated in the 6th Annual Kika Summer Camp. Participants were immersed in the ridge to reef experience and impacts to watersheds and marine life.

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The mission of the Bureau of Statistics and Plans is to ensure Guam's resources are effectively used for the benefit of present and future generations by appraising, coordinating, preparing, and assisting in the development of a wide range of plans, policies, studies and statistics that further economic, social, land use, environmental and infrastructural goals, priorities and planning activities.

BSP is a staff agency to the Office of the Governor. Other public laws and Governor's Executive Orders granted additional roles to BSP such as providing administrative support to the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council and providing a preliminary Business Sector Disaster Damage report to the Governor in the aftermath of a Typhoon.

The Bureau employed approximately 31 employees that supported five program divisions:



PROGRAM PERFORMANCE

The Impact of the Compacts of Free Association FY 2016 Annual Report was completed. The cost for Guam to provide educational, public safety and health and welfare services to Freely Associated State citizens was \$142,310,058 million.



In 2016, a total of \$62.6 million in federal assistance extended to FAS migrants and their children living on Guam.

The Bureau reviewed 143 applications in 2016 for consistency with Guam's policies and adherence with applicable federal and local statutes and Guam State Clearinghouse requirements. This is a 29% increase in reviews conducted from 2015.





The Bureau of Statistics and Plans applied and received eight (8) grant awards totaling \$2,619,901. The Bureau experienced a 25% increase in major grant awards as compared to FY 2015 in addition to a new award under the Saltonstall-Kennedy Grant Program. BSP manages approximately 7.2 million in both new and active grants. USDOJ and NOAA grants are awarded for a 2 to 3 year grant period with approximately 90% passed to subrecipients to implement criminal justice projects, coastal and environmental initiatives.

EXPENDITURES

BSP's expenditures primarily consisted of salaries and benefits. Operational expenditures from the General Fund included contractual, telephone and supplies, and subsidized rent for the Guam Developmental Disabilities Council (GDDC). Of the 31 employees of the Bureau in FY 2016, 19 were locally funded and 12 were 100 percent federally funded. A total \$822,109 in federal funds was used to cover personnel expenses.





GCMP hosted the first ever Planners Symposium which brought together local, private, military and federal technical experts to discuss policy, best practices and how to effectively address policy changes to ensure protection of the islands natural resources.

Challenges in 2016:

- ◆ Although the Bureau's mandates did not change, additional program initiatives were absorbed that required the skills of senior program staff which were unfortunately lost to retirement.
- Implementing a succession plan to build capacity and institutional knowledge of critical program areas remains a challenge with funding.
- Obtaining federal clearances in a timely manner on special award conditions such as congressional mandates, the Section 106 review process, permitting requirements, and GSA procurement to meet grant requirements and achieve full implementation of project activities.



BSP coordinated the pilot project for the removal of invasive bamboo at the Manell-Geus (Merizo) watershed for forest restoration and replanting of native species. One year after the initial cutting, vegetation has proliferated and flourished in the area.

MOVING FORWARD IN 2017......

The BSP will continue moving forward in 2017 with the following and more:

- ◆ Publish quarterly publications for Import and Export Trade Data and Consumer Price Index reports. ◆
- ◆ Develop and publish the 2017 Statistical Yearbook, the 2016 Guam Facts & Figures At-A-Glance brochure and other statistical indices for policy makers, researchers, and businesses to make sound decisions to improve the island's economic viability and resource sustainability.
- Provide technical support to GovGuam entities when needed in order that they meet their missions.
- ◆ Continue collaboration with US Census Bureau officials and stakeholders on Guam in the planning of the 2020 ◆ Census
- Continue to prepare the Annual Compact Impact Report to identify and assess the costs incurred for services to Freely Associated States migrants on Guam.
- Apply for continued funding support from USDOJ to further improve and advocate criminal justice initiatives on Island.
- ◆ Provide technical assistance to GEDA on the development of a new Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy.
- Continue securing federal dollars from NOAA and DOI to compile commercial

fishery data; coral reef, coastal and environmental conservation initiatives.

- BSP involvement in the Safe Housing
 Task Force and the Imagine Guam 2065.
- ◆ Provide technical assistance to Department of Agriculture to update the 2017 Marine Conservation Plan.
- ◆ Coordinate and develop Guam's new FY 2017-2020 Drug Control, Violent Crime and Criminal Justice Systems Improvement Grant Program.
- Serve as the catalyst for planned and balanced economic, social, environmental and physical growth through intergovernmental reviews via the Guam State Clearinghouse, legislative review of bills, and the mandated review process of elements via Comprehensive Development Plans.
- Continue GLUC and Federal Consistency reviews and GIS Mapping to ensure sustainable and well planned development efforts are central to protecting Guam's natural resources.
- Coordinate 23rd Guam International Coastal Cleanup, the 7th Kika Clearwater Summer Camp and publication of the Man, Land and Sea Newsletters.
- Conduct study on flooding within the Manell
 -Geus watersheds located in Merizo and
 develop outreach materials for residents
 highlighting both flooding issues as well as
 green infrastructure options for flood

- mitigation at the residential, community, and governmental scale.
- Continue to conduct education and environmental awareness with schools and community outreach programs such as the Guardians of the Reef, Eyes on the Reef, the Pig Hunting Derby and Pork in the Park Cook-Off to promote and advocate best management practices in protecting the island's coastal environment and balance of sustainable uses of resources and capabilities.



Guam & CNMI co-hosted the 36th U.S. Coral Reef Task Force with member states, local, federal and fisheries and marine stakeholders.
