The Charter School was established (1) to provide a free, public charter school that is non-discriminatory in its admission policies; (2) to enroll students who reside throughout any of the villages on Guam; and (3) to serve as a prototype school for the National Institute for Direct Instruction (NIFDI) School Wide Reform Model.







OUR DEMOGRAPHICS: SY 2021-2022








The top three (3) villages that make up the school's population are Dededo, Yigo, Mangilao, with 22%, 12%, and 11% respectively.

OUR PERFORMANCE: SY 2021-2022




There was a 21% decrease of graduates compared to SY 2020-2021. Holding Summer classes allowed the seniors to earn one full credit in six weeks of half-day classes. Fifteen percent of those who did not graduate were due to off-island transfers.

Administration

In the English subtest, there was a 14% decrease of students who are in the need of support category. One percent more in the "close"; 35% are now "ready" compared to 22% in the previous year; and 3% increase of students who are now in the "exceeding" level. In the Reading subtest, there is a 7% decrease in the "need of support" level. Four percent increase in the "close"; 3% more are "ready"; and 3% more are in the "exceeding level". In Math, students who are in "need of support" decreased by 12%. There are 12% more students in the "close" level. Generally, despite the learning interruptions caused by COVID-19, district wide assessment scores significantly improved.

OUR CHALLENGES AND FUTURE OUTLOOK:

Accreditation

Guahan Academy Charter School was granted a full five-year accreditation through June 30, 2025 by the North Central Association Commission on Accreditation and School Improvement, the Northwest Accreditation Commission, and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Council on Accreditation and School Improvement.

Challenges

There was an increase in the rate of absences from both students and employees. Teacher retention is a major concern this school year due to inflation rates and Governor approved pay increase for GDOE teachers. Although GACS continue to work on planning and building a new facility, finding a contractor or a developer who can support the acquisition of a permanent home for our Kindergarten to 12th grade students, remains a challenge.

Accomplishment and Outlook

The school-wide action plan's goal on student achievement was fulfilled as reflected by the district wide assessment results. Opportunities to bridge the learning loss were made available through summer classes and sports development. School improvement aspect was also fulfilled as the following objectives were met:

- Development of "compensation schedule" that allows for professional growth;
- Data driven Professional Development opportunities; b.
- Maintenance and renovation of primary classrooms for safety; C.
- Renovation of employee lounge and administrative offices to streamline workflow and school operations
