In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Guam Highway Fund and of those funds related to the Government of Guam Limited Obligation Highway Refunding Bonds, 2001 Series A (the Funds), as of and for the year ended September 30, 2016, on which we have issued our report dated March 31, 2017, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, we considered the Funds' internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Funds' internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Funds' internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting. However, in connection with our audit, we identified, and included in the attached Appendix I, deficiencies and other matters involving the Funds' internal control over financial reporting as of September 30, 2016 that we wish to bring to your attention.

We have also issued a separate report to the Governor of Guam, Honorable Eddie Baza Calvo, also dated March 31, 2017, on our consideration of the Funds' internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters.

The definition of a deficiency is also set forth in the attached Appendix I.

A description of the responsibility of management for establishing and maintaining internal control over financial reporting and of the objectives of and inherent limitations of internal control over financial reporting, is set forth in the attached Appendix II and should be read in conjunction with this report.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the management of the Funds, the Office of Public Accountability of Guam, federal awarding agencies, pass-through entities, the cognizant audit and other federal agencies, and others within the organization, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

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We will be pleased to discuss the attached comments with you and, if desired, to assist you in implementing any of the suggestions.

We wish to thank the staff and management of the Department of Administration for their cooperation and assistance during the course of this engagement.

SECTION I - DEFICIENCIES

We identified the following deficiencies involving the Funds' internal control over financial reporting as of September 30, 2016 that we wish to bring to your attention:

(1) Encumbrances

<u>Comment</u>: Public Law 27-78 states that an encumbrance against any type of appropriation shall be automatically returned to those Funds against which it was encumbered nine (9) months after fiscal year end in which the encumbrance was originally recorded, unless the encumbrance falls under requirements imposed by United States law governing United Sates Federal awards. All capital improvements or capital outlay project encumbrances shall be exempted from this requirement. As of September 30, 2016, the Guam Highway Fund recorded encumbrances of \$2,013,564 relating to streetlight utilities that were invalid.

Recommendation: We recommend that encumbrances be reviewed for ongoing pertinence.

<u>Auditee Response</u>: The Department of Administration will communicate with the Department of Public Works regarding the reconciliation of streetlight utilities encumbrances.

SECTION II - OTHER MATTERS

We also identified, and have included below, other matters involving the Funds' internal control over financial reporting as of September 30, 2016 that we wish to bring to your attention:

(1) Cellular Phone Services

<u>Comment</u>: Public Law 32-068, Chapter XII, stipulates restrictions on the use of GovGuam funds for the purchase of wireless services. Based on scrutiny of expenditures incurred, we noted cellular phone charges totaling \$23,073.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that management require compliance with restrictions imposed on the use of cellular phone services.

<u>Auditee Response</u>: The Department of Administration will issue a circular reiterating to all agencies of the restrictions regarding the use of cellular phone services.

SECTION III - DEFINITIONS

The definition of a deficiency is as follows:

A deficiency exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A deficiency in design exists when (a) a control necessary to meet the control objective is missing or (b) an existing control is not properly designed so that, even if the control operates as designed, the control objective would not be met. A deficiency in operation exists when (a) a properly designed control does not operate as designed, or (b) the person performing the control does not possess the necessary authority or competence to perform the control effectively.

MANAGEMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR, AND THE OBJECTIVES AND LIMITATIONS OF, INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING

The following comments concerning management's responsibility for internal control over financial reporting and the objectives and inherent limitations of internal control over financial reporting are adapted from auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America.

Management's Responsibility

The Funds' management is responsible for the overall accuracy of the financial statements and their conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. In this regard, management is also responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting.

Objectives of Internal Control over Financial Reporting

Internal control over financial reporting is a process affected by those charged with governance, management, and other personnel and designed to provide reasonable assurance about the achievement of the entity's objectives with regard to reliability of financial reporting, effectiveness and efficiency of operations, and compliance with applicable laws and regulations. Internal control over the safeguarding of assets against unauthorized acquisition, use, or disposition may include controls related to financial reporting and operations objectives. Generally, controls that are relevant to an audit of financial statements are those that pertain to the entity's objective of reliable financial reporting (i.e., the preparation of reliable financial statements that are fairly presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles).

Inherent Limitations of Internal Control over Financial Reporting

Because of the inherent limitations of internal control over financial reporting, including the possibility of collusion or improper management override of controls, material misstatements due to error or fraud may not be prevented or detected on a timely basis. Also, projections of any evaluation of the effectiveness of the internal control over financial reporting to future periods are subject to the risk that the controls may become inadequate because of changes in conditions, or that the degree of compliance with the policies or procedures may deteriorate.
